Feering's reading, writing and maths attainment and progress exceed the national average by 10%, a greater proportion of our children leaving Feering are better prepared than most for the next step in their educational journey. Progress data is broadly in line with national but shows that last years Year 6 pupils made more than expected progress during their time in Key Stage 2 in all areas other than mathematics based on end of KS1 assessments.

We continue to strive to ensure our pupils leave Feering having many memories of a primary career that has not only been academically successful but has included a rich and varied range of experiences.

Data is used in school to help shape improvement and we constantly strive to develop further along with many other forms of monitoring, including pupil voice and reviewing books.
