JUDAISM — SPRING 1		
EARLY YEARS FOUNDATION STAGE		
What happens in a synagogue?		
Some children will	Talk about the name of God as being special.	
	Recognise that there are special places where people go to worship.	
Most children will	Talk about the fact that Jewish people believe in God.	
	Recognise that there are special places where people go to worship and talk about what people do there.	
Some children will	Talk about ways in which objects, symbols and actions used in the synagogue show what people believe.	
YEAR 1		
	What do Jewish people remember on Shabbat?	
Some children will	Talk about the fact that Jewish people believe in God.	
	Recognise that some Jewish people remember God on Shabbat.	
Most children will	Talk about how Shabbat is a special day of the week for Jewish people and give some examples of what they might do to celebrate Shabbat.	
Some children will	Make links between some Jewish teachings and how Jewish people celebrate Shabbat.	
	Suggest meanings for some symbols and actions used to celebrate Shabbat.	
YEAR 2		
How is Passover celebrated?		
Some children will	Talk about the importance of Shabbat and celebrations to Jewish people.	
	Recognise simple links between the food and actions and the festival story.	
Most children will	Explain what the festival story remembered at Passover teaches Jewish people.	
	Explain what each of the foods and activities reminds Jewish people about.	
Some children will	Explain why the festival of Passover is important to Jewish people.	
	Ask and respond to questions about some ways that Jewish people remember God.	
YEAR 3		
How do Jews make moral decisions?		
Some children will	Ask and respond to questions about some ways Jewish people remember God.	
	Describe simply how Jewish people use their sources of wisdom to make moral decisions.	
Most children will	Recognise and talk thoughtfully about the uses of holy writing in helping Jews to make moral decisions.	

	Give examples of reasons why a Jew uses their scriptures to make moral decisions.
Some children will	Consider and discuss questions about using religious texts to make ethical decisions.
	 Explain similarities and differences between how Jews and Christians make moral decisions.
	YEAR 4
	How does worship give Jews a sense of identity and belonging?
Some children will	Describe some ways in which Jews show their sense of identity through worship.
Most children will	Explain how Jewish worship uses the Torah.
	 Weigh up the value of worship in the lives of Jews today.
Some children will	• Explain how Jewish people from different parts of the community say different things about the Torah and how it contributes to their worship.
	• Give and explain examples of Jewish belief about what the Torah is, how it is treated and how it is used. Explain why the Torah is sacred in Judaism.
	YEAR 5
	What does it mean to be part of a global religious community?
Some children will	• Think thoughtfully about the values and beliefs that make a difference within a global religious community.
	 Describe different practices within a global religious community.
Most children will	 Recognise and talk thoughtfully about the impact of being part of a global religious community.
	 Explain why some people express belief although within the same religion in different ways.
	 Give one reason why it is important to engage with the global religious community.
Some children will	 Consider and discuss questions about the importance of global religious communities in the world today.
YEAR 6	
	One narrative: many beliefs. Why do people interpret things differently?
Some children will	 Consider and discuss questions about the importance of global religious communities in the world today.
	• Give one example of how people interpret things differently in worship, celebration of festivals, living practice
	and within the global community of Judaism.
Most children will	• Explain examples of beliefs and reasons why these beliefs make a difference to how people live.
	• Express understanding of ways in which beliefs are interpreted differently and put into action within religious
	communities.
Some children will	Give reasoned examples of why and how people interpret things differently within the Abrahamic tradition
	(Christianity, Judaism, Islam).
